## 100<sup>th</sup> Infantry Battalion (1942-46)

In 1942, the Hawaiian Provisional Infantry Battalion, comprised mostly of Japanese Americans, was activated in the Territory of Hawai'i. They were renamed the 100<sup>th</sup> Infantry Battalion after being transferred to mainland United States. The 100<sup>th</sup> was deployed in 1943 to Europe, where they became known as the "Purple Heart Battalion" and received two Distinguished Unit Citations. In 1944, they formally joined with the 442<sup>nd</sup> Regimental Combat Team, and together, they were called the 100/442. The unit was inactivated in 1946. More than 1,400 nisei served on the 100<sup>th</sup>.

The Distinguished Unit Insignia of the 100<sup>th</sup> contains their motto, "Remember Pearl Harbor" as a reminder of why the men were fighting. The leaf symbolizes protection in Hawaiian culture and the Hawaiian chieftain helmet symbolizes strength and valor.
