



China Mac

China Mac grew up in Chinatown surrounded by gang activity. His mother worked two jobs to support the family when his father went to jail. At the age of eight, Mac joined the Ghost Shadow Gang and committed crimes that led him in and out of group homes, juvenile detention, and prison. He always had a love of hip-hop and used rap to express his frustrations. A visit from his mother while in prison motivated China Mac to use freestyle rap skills to improve himself. In 2013, he was released from prison and founded Red Money Records and gained some fame in the United States with his first album *M.I.T.M.* (2017) and subsequent album *Yin and Yang* (2019). He became an activist in 2020 during the rise of anti-Asian hate crimes when the COVID-19 pandemic ravaged the country. China Mac co-organized rallies in Brooklyn, Los Angeles, and San Francisco to raise awareness around anti-Asian hate crimes. These marches adopted a rally call of “They Can’t Burn Us All” which later became the title for his rap single. He continues to unite Asian Americans and other marginalized communities to fight against racism.
