## All S.F. high schools to offer ethnic studies

All San Francisco high schools will offer ethnic studies courses starting in the fall, a significant step toward the district's goal of providing a more inclusive and equitable education for all students, school board members agreed Tuesday in a unanimous vote.

or of the resolution to expand the program, said she believes it's a valuable class that should be taught across the district — and shouldn't become a required course. Her fellow board members agreed.

Board member Family Murren called the course an answer to the "current crisis in race relations." The district will need to hire a full-time ethnic studies coordinator at a cost of \$150,000, and then

total to \$470,000, or \$320,000 more than this year. In addition, the district would need to spend about \$100,000 in staff time, books and training to get the courses up and running by next fall. More than 100 students, teachers and parents attended the meeting to show support for the initiative at Thursday night's meeting. Ethnic studies, "opened my mind and my peers' minds to a sense of identity and exposed us to ethnic history and individuality," said Denise Chien, a sophomore at Lincoln High School. "It also put a great stress on community. I believe this should be teaching we should have in all schools in San Francisco."

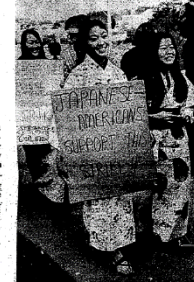
Labor Commissioner Union teachers at San Francisco State College courted arrest, fines, loss of pay and — most especially — the loss of their jobs yesterday as they continued picketing in defiance of a court order.

It was the fifth day of their strike and they were supposed to lose their jobs, under State Education Code provisions which state that a teacher has resigned automatically if he is out of class for five consecutive days without authorization.

The San Francisco author- ities wanted to carry out the law. They were divided if it was really difficult to determine just who had or had not been on strike for five days.
